SUBJECT: Examination of Costs Claimed for CAMRIS International, Inc. for the Two Years

Ended December 31, 2017 and 2016 (3-000-21-026-I)

This memorandum transmits the final examination report on CAMRIS International, Inc. (CAMRIS) on in-scope awards and subawards for each of the two years ended December 31, 2017 and 2016. The U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) Office of Acquisition and Assistance, Cost, Audit, and Support Division contracted with the independent certified public accounting firm of Brown & Company CPAs and Management Consultants, PLLC (Brown & Company) to conduct the examination. The audit firm stated that it performed its examination in accordance with attestation standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the standards applicable to attestation engagements contained in generally accepted government auditing standards. The audit firm is responsible for the enclosed report and the conclusions expressed in it. We do not express an opinion on whether costs claimed by CAMRIS on in-scope awards and subawards for each of the two years ended December 31, 2017 and 2016 are allowable, allocable and reasonable in accordance with award terms; Part 31 of the Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR); Agency for International Development Acquisition Regulation (AIDAR); Department of State Standardized Regulation (DSSR); and 2 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards, as applicable.

The examination's objective was to express an opinion on whether the costs claimed by CAMRIS on in-scope awards and subawards for each of the two years ended December 31, 2017 and 2016 are allowable, allocable, and reasonable in accordance with award terms; Part 31 of the FAR; AIDAR; DSSR; and 2 CFR 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards, as applicable. To answer the examination's objective, Brown & Company designed its testing procedures to evaluate the internal control environment surrounding CAMRIS's subcontract management process and to verify that

CAMRIS had adequate controls in place for monitoring subcontract costs. Its examination included the reconciliation of the adjusted total costs booked to date and the cumulative amount billed, by award or subaward and reporting any over/under-billings. The audit firm examined USAID incurred costs of \$102,782,671 the two years ended December 31, 2017 and 2016.

Brown & Company expressed an unmodified opinion that costs claimed by CAMRIS on inscope awards and subawards for the two years ended December 31, 2017 and 2016 are allowable, allocable, and reasonable in accordance with award terms; Part 31 of the FAR; AIDAR; DSSR; and 2 CFR 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards*, as applicable, in all material respects. Brown & Company 's examination did not disclose any findings that are required to be reported under government auditing standards. Brown & Company did not identify any questioned costs.
