SUBJECT:	Financial Audit of USAID Resources Managed by Mission for Essential Drugs and Supplies in Kenya Under Multiple Awards, January 1 to December 31, 2022 (Report No. 4-615-24-024-R)		

This memorandum transmits the final audit report on USAID resources managed by Mission for Essential Drugs and Supplies (MEDS) under the following awards:

MEDS contracted with the independent audit firm Deloitte & Touche LLP, Nairobi, Kenya to conduct the audit. The audit firm stated that it performed its audit in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards. However, it did not have an external peer review or a continuing professional education program that fully satisfy the standards' requirements. The audit firm is responsible for the enclosed report and the conclusions expressed in it. We do not express an opinion on MEDS' schedule of expenditures of USAID awards; the effectiveness of its internal control; or its compliance with the award, laws, and regulations.<sup>1</sup>

The audit objectives were to (1) express an opinion on whether the schedule of expenditures of USAID awards for the period audited, was presented fairly, in all material respects; (2) evaluate MEDS' internal controls; (3) determine whether MEDS complied with award terms and

applicable laws and regulations; (4) review the indirect cost rate; and (5) review the implementation status of the prior period recommendations.

To answer the audit objectives, Deloitte & Touche LLP (1) audited the schedule of expenditures of USAID awards including the budgeted amounts by category and major items and the revenues received from USAID for the period covered by the audit and the costs reported by MEDS as incurred from January 1 to December 31, 2022; (2) evaluated the control environment, the adequacy of the accounting systems, and control procedures that pertain to MEDS's ability to report financial data consistent with the assertions embodied in each account of the schedule of expenditures of USAID awards; (3) identified the award terms and pertinent laws and regulations and determined which of those, if not observed, could have a direct and material effect on the schedule of expenditures of USAID awards; (4) determined that the review of the indirect cost rate was not applicable; and (5) reviewed the implementation status of the prior period recommendations. MEDS reported expenditures of \$5,480,491 in USAID funds during the audited period.

The audit firm concluded the schedule of expenditures of USAID awards presented fairly, in all material respects, program revenues and costs incurred under the award for the period audited. The audit firm identified \$187,236 in total questioned costs (\$166,964 ineligible and \$20,272 unsupported); no material weaknesses in internal control; and four instances of material noncompliance. In addition, although we are not making a recommendation for the significant deficiencies noted in the report, we suggest that USAID/Kenya and East Africa determine if the recipient addressed the issues noted.

During our desk review, we noted several areas for improvement which the audit firm should address in future audit reports. We presented these areas in a memo to the controller, dated November 6, 2023.

To address the issues identified in the report, we recommend that USAID/Kenya and East Africa:

**Recommendation 1.** Determine the allowability of \$187,236 in questioned costs (\$166,964 ineligible, \$20,272 unsupported) on pages 27 and 40 of the audit report and recover any amount that is unallowable.

**Recommendation 2.** Verify that Mission for Essential Drugs and Supplies corrects the four instances of material noncompliance detailed on pages 62 to 68 of the audit report.

We ask that you provide your written notification of actions planned or taken to reach management decision.
