SUBJECT: Examination of Incurred Costs Claimed on Flexibly Priced Contracts by IOS Partners, Inc. for the Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 2017 (3-000-22-011-I)

This memorandum transmits the final examination report on Incurred Costs Claimed on Flexibly Priced Contracts by IOS Partners, Inc. (IOS) for the Fiscal Year Ended December 31, 2017. The U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) Office of Acquisition and Assistance, Cost, Audit, and Support Division contracted with the independent certified public accounting firm of Booth Management Consulting, LLC (BMC) to conduct the examination. The audit firm stated that it performed its examination in accordance with attestation standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the standards applicable to attestation engagements contained in generally accepted government auditing standards. The audit firm is responsible for the enclosed report and the conclusions expressed in it. We do not express an opinion on whether costs claimed by IOS on in-scope contracts and subcontracts for the fiscal year ended December 31, 2017 are allowable, allocable and reasonable in accordance with award terms; Part 31 of the Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR); Agency for International Development Acquisition Regulation (AIDAR); Department of State Standardized Regulation (DSSR); and 2 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards*, as applicable.¹

The examination's objective was to express an opinion on whether the costs claimed by IOS on in-scope contracts and subcontracts for the fiscal year ended December 31, 2017 are allowable, allocable, and reasonable in accordance with contract terms; Part 31 of the FAR; AIDAR; DSSR; and 2 CFR 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards*, as applicable. To answer the examination's objective, BMC designed its testing procedures to evaluate the internal control environment surrounding IOS's subcontract management process and to verify that IOS had adequate controls in place for monitoring subcontractor costs. Its examination included the reconciliation of the adjusted total costs booked to date and the cumulative amount billed, by contract or subcontract and reporting any over/under-billings. The audit firm examined USAID incurred costs of \$468,401 for the fiscal year ended December 31, 2017.

¹ We reviewed the audit firm's report for conformity with professional reporting standards. Our desk reviews are typically performed to identify any items needing clarification or issues requiring management attention. Desk reviews are limited to review of the audit report itself and excludes review of the auditor's supporting working papers; they are not designed to enable us to directly evaluate the quality of the audit performed.

BMC expressed a qualified opinion due to submitted amounts that did not materially comply with contract terms pertaining to accumulating and billing incurred amounts. According to BMC, except for the instances of non-compliance described below, costs claimed by IOS on in-scope unsettled flexibly-priced contracts and subcontracts for the fiscal year ended December 31, 2017 are allowable, allocable, and reasonable in accordance with contract terms; Part 31 of the FAR; AIDAR; DSSR; and 2 CFR 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards*, as applicable. The audit firm identified indirect questioned costs of \$295,897 composed of \$199,436 in Overhead and \$96,461 in G&A pool costs. The audit firm's examination disclosed one finding that is required to be reported under government auditing standards. Finding #1, Non-Compliance with Company Procurement Policy, represents a significant deficiency. Although we are not making a recommendation for the significant deficiency noted in the report, we suggest that USAID/Management/Office of Acquisition and Assistance/Cost Audit and Support Division determine if the recipient addressed the issue noted.
