SUBJECT: Financial Audit of USAID Resources Managed by Heartland Alliance Limited/GTE in Nigeria Under Multiple Awards, January 1 to December 31, 2024 (Report No. 4-620-26-002-R)

This memorandum transmits the final audit report on USAID resources managed by Heartland Alliance Limited/GTE (HALG) under: (1) Cooperative Agreement 72062020CA00001, Community HIV Services for Action and Response (CARE 1) Project; and (2) Cooperative Agreement 72062022CA00002, Accelerating the Control of HIV Epidemic in Nigeria Cluster 6 project. HALG contracted with the independent audit firm Ijewere & Co., Lagos, Nigeria to conduct the audit. The audit firm stated that it performed its audit in accordance with generally accepted government auditing standards (GAGAS). However, it did not have an external peer review and a continuing professional education program that fully satisfy the standards' requirements. The audit firm is responsible for the enclosed report and the conclusions expressed in it. We do not express an opinion on HALG's schedule of expenditures of USAID awards; the effectiveness of its internal control; or its compliance with the award, laws, and regulations.¹

The audit objectives were to (1) express an opinion on whether the schedule of expenditures of USAID awards for the period audited, was presented fairly, in all material respects; (2) evaluate HALG's internal controls; (3) determine whether HALG complied with award terms and applicable laws and regulations; (4) review the indirect cost rate; and (5) review the implementation status of the prior period recommendations.

To answer the audit objectives, Ijewere & Co., Lagos, Nigeria (1) audited the schedule of expenditures of USAID awards including the budgeted amounts by category and major items and the revenues received from USAID for the period covered by the audit and the costs

reported by HALG as incurred from January 1 to December 31, 2024; (2) evaluated the control environment, the adequacy of the accounting systems, and control procedures that pertain to HALG's ability to report financial data consistent with the assertions embodied in each account of the schedule of expenditures of USAID awards; (3) identified the award terms and pertinent laws and regulations and determined which of those, if not observed, could have a direct and material effect on the schedule of expenditures of USAID awards; (4) determined the review of the indirect cost rate was not applicable; and (5) reviewed the implementation status of the prior period recommendations. HALG reported expenditures of \$13,075,171 in USAID funds during the audited period.

The audit firm concluded the schedule of expenditures of USAID awards presented fairly, in all material respects, program revenues and costs incurred under the awards for the period audited. The audit firm identified \$46 ineligible questioned costs; no material weaknesses in internal control; and no instances of material noncompliance. Since the questioned costs did not meet the OIG's established threshold of \$25,000 for making a recommendation, we are not making a recommendation. Nevertheless, we suggest that USAID/Nigeria determine the allowability of the \$46 in questioned costs and recover any amount determined to be unallowable. In addition, although we are not making a recommendation for significant deficiency noted in the report, we suggest that USAID/Nigeria determine if the recipient addressed the issues noted. The audit firm also issued a management letter.

Accordingly, we are not making any recommendations.

OIG does not routinely distribute independent public accounting reports beyond the immediate addressees because a high percentage of these reports contain information restricted from release under the Trade Secrets Act, 18 U.S.C. 1905 and Freedom of Information Act Exemption Four, 5 U.S.C. 552(b)(4) ("commercial or financial information obtained from a person that is privileged or confidential"). In addition, USAID OIG has determined that this transmittal memo and the enclosed report are not subject to notification and reporting requirements under Section 5274 of the National Defense Authorization Act.²
